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

Professor. Paul Goldstein

A globally recognized expert on intellectual property law, Paul Goldstein is the author of an influential four-volume treatise on U.S. copyright law and a one-volume treatise on international copyright law, as well as leading casebooks on intellectual property and international intellectual property. He has authored nine books including three novels devoted to intellectual property themes, Errors and Omissions and A Patent Lie. Some of his other works include Copyright's Highway: From Gutenberg to the Celestial Jukebox, a widely acclaimed book on the history and future of copyright, and Intellectual Property: The Tough New Realities That Could Make or Break Your Business. Havana Requiem, his most recent novel, has won the 2013 Harper Lee Prize for Legal Fiction.

In 2015 he was inducted by Intellectual Asset Management into the IP Hall of Fame, which honors those who have helped to establish intellectual property as one of the key business assets of the 21st century. Professor Goldstein currently serves as of counsel at Morrison & Foerster in their intellectual property group and has been regularly included in Best Lawyers in America. He has served as chairman of the U.S. Office of Technology Assessment Advisory Panel on Intellectual Property Rights in an Age of Electronics and Information, has been a visiting scholar at the Max Planck Institute for Foreign and International Patent, Copyright, and Competition Law in Munich, Germany, and was a founding faculty member of the Munich Intellectual Property Law Center. In addition, before joining the Stanford Law School faculty in 1975, he was a professor of law at the State University of New York at Buffalo Law School.

Assoc. Professor. David Tan

Associate Professor David Tan is Vice Dean (Academic Affairs) at the Faculty of Law, National University of Singapore, and oversees the academic curriculum for both undergraduate and master degree programs. He holds a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) from Melbourne Law School and a Master of Laws (LLM) from Harvard.

He pioneered the course Entertainment Law at NUS Law, and was previously a Senior Fellow at Melbourne Law School. His areas of research cover personality rights, copyright, trademarks, as well as freedom of expression – in particular First Amendment jurisprudence – and tort law. His law publications have appeared in a wide range of journals that include *Harvard Journal of Sports & Entertainment Law, Yale Journal of International Law, Virginia Sports & Entertainment Law Journal, WIPO Journal, Sydney Law Review, Law Quarterly Review, Singapore Journal of Legal Studies, Media & Arts Law Review* and *Torts Law Journal.* His forthcoming book on celebrity image rights titled "The Commercial Appropriation of Fame" will be published by Cambridge University Press.

In addition to his career in academia, David is a wellknown fashion and fine art photographer in Singapore, and has had solo exhibitions presented by luxury brands Cartier and Versace. He has also photographed celebrities like Maggie Cheung, Kit Chan and Godfrey Gao, and has contributed to magazines like Harper's Bazaar, Marie Claire and Elle.

David was previously a director with the Singapore Administrative Service and had served at the Ministry of Manpower (MOM) and Ministry of Community Development, Youth & Sports (MCYS).
